


#### From our President







## April Demo By Rick Delanty April 14, 2024

The Art Demo room was filled to capacity with art enthusiasts and artists who were excited to see Rick Delanty take a daytime scene and turn it into a nocturne. This is what Rick calls a "Mockturne" because one is not outdoors painting, but instead, using one's imagination to make the image nocturnal. The first order of business was Rick asked us all to stand and repeat after him: his very own "Pledge Allegiance to the Art." It goes like this...."I pledge allegiance to the design, and to the ideals for which it stands. One composition, under my control. Indivisible. With freedom and enjoyment for all." This elicited laughter from the audience and Rick wasted no time throwing down his underpainting, using Golden Open brand acrylic paints. He took this time to discuss the critical importance of the artist first sketching the design of the painting, and he stressed that using a gray paper sketch book is very important to getting the values worked out, ahead of the painting phase. Rick told us very emphatically that this practice of sketching before drawing it on the canvas prevents problems for the future painting. He also handed out a one-page handout with nocturne tips. Rick's palette today was comprised of only 6 colors, 4 of them being blue. Here they are: Warm White. Lemon Yellow. Quinacridone Red. UM Blue, Cobalt Blue, Thalo Blue and Turquoise.

The first step is to get the value right on the canvas. Rick demonstrated this and he used a large 2 inch brush that he is proud to say is from DeNault's Hardware Store here in San Clemente. When painting a nocturne, the artist is not interested in the color white. Everything that you see at night is softer, he wants to capture the ten-

derness of the night, and there shouldn't be too much detail in the painting, that's what will kill it. Rick emphasized that we keep soft edges on everything and he also took the time to warn us that we should not make the night painting too dark. Sometimes the sky is lighter than the trees. This is true to what you see with your own two eyes when you're outdoors when it is dark. Rick circled around to remind us that the drawing phase of the painting is so crucial to the success of the artwork. He told us all to take a formal sketching class, and to gather up art supplies so that sketch-

ing becomes a daily habit. This is the way to get better, and there isn't any other





pathway to being a better painter than to be a better sketch artist. Rick said that he likes to paint in the big shapes at the beginning of a painting, and the first 5 minutes are the most fun because the artist is at his free-est. Use a cross-hatch sort of brushstroke using a thin coat of paint to create deeper interest to the painting. The brushstrokes will show through in the end. Rick encouraged us all to move quickly, but not to rush - as he stated, "Too much time on a painting means too much thinking." And thinking is the thing that gets him into trouble because sometimes he spends too much time on a painting when it was time he should quit.

Rick takes a picture of his painting at the first stage that he thinks he is done. Sometimes he can't stop himself from working on the art a little more, but this is when the painting takes a left turn and he realizes (too late) that he should have stopped earlier. He confesses that





when he realizes that he overdid a painting, it really hurts because he can't go back.

The last 10 minutes of a painting is when we should move the slowest because it is the most difficult stage.

Rick went on with his painting, and then he asked the audience, "Who are you painting for?" It should be for YOU. He impressed on us to

always do our best, but in the end, the person who should be satisfied is you yourself. When Rick enters into plein air contests or other types of art showcases, he says that he never knows if the painting will be successful. He is just as afraid of it failing as the rest



of us, but he keeps a positive frame of mind that everything will work out just fine.

He encouraged us to be patient as we progress through our painting. "It won't happen immediately. Be patient, and let the painting talk to you." Rick realizes that this advice may sound a little funny, but

he says that if you are really zoned into creating a scene or a person or a still-life, let the art take you down

your own road. He likes to play music in the background sometimes, mostly he likes non-lyrical type of music because there are no words to corrupt your train of thought, you will paint more fluidly with non-lyrical type of music. Rick mentioned classical music such as Bach is very mind opening to an artist. Music buoys an artist up and onwards: music can help push a painting along when some inspiration is needed. There is so much more that I can share with you now, but there's too much content for this publication. I can only hope that you clear your calendars as much as possible and try your best to join in on all the future art demos we are putting together for your learning, growing and enjoyment.



The door prize winner was Catherine Singer; she won a beautiful nocturne painting by Rick which was beautifully framed - and everyone oohed and awed. Good things happen at these Sunday Art Demos...be sure to attend the next ones!
